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WELCOME to Issue Nine of Folk in Cornwall. I Hope you had a good Christmas and New Year. I'm writing this at the beginning of December when the days are still getting shorter, the countryside is still sleeping and the prospect of Christmas is looming over the horizon.

By the time you read it Christmas will have come and gone and the days will be starting to get longer again. Many years ago my one and only attempt at songwriting produced a song about the approach of spring — Each Day the Light Lasts Longer. The first signs start with the lengthening days, in my garden the bluebells that grow like weeds poke their leaves up out of the ground around new year and I feel I can start looking forward to spring.

If you don't feel like hibernating there is a lot of folk action to join in with over the winter. All the clubs and sessions keep running – apart from a break of a week or two over Christmas.

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Some of the Morris teams will be dancing out in the weeks leading up to Christmas and there will be lots of opportunities for carol singing (I consider the chance to sing Lyngham one of the best features of Christmas).

Over the holidays there are several one off events to think about. For instance in Lostwithiel we have a tradition on New Year's Eve where the Giants, figures made from paper wood and other materials, process through the town to the accompaniment of music.

Then in January there will be Wassailing and, in West Cornwall, Guise Dancing (see feature elsewhere in this magazine).

Folk in Cornwall has now been going for two years and the word about us is still spreading as more people contact me with details of sessions and other activities. Recent contacts have allowed me to include more details about Cornish music which is one aspect of the folk scene we haven't said much about yet.

Google also knows about us now. Searching for Folk in Cornwall will bring up an image of what Google thinks is my house (actually it isn't).

Also a couple of times when I've phoned people from my house about work – which is absolutely nothing to do with any aspect of the folk scene – I've been greeted with the question "why is my phone telling me you are Folk in Cornwall?"

The answer presumably being because Google is trying, and failing, to be clever again.

Finally thanks to all who continue to support the Magazine and to send me their good wishes. May you all have a happy and healthy 2019.

Latest Folk News



The number of sessions listed has increased again in this issue as we have received more notifications of existing sessions and details of new sessions starting.

First is The Artillery Arms Session – just over the border in Plymouth, but Marilyn who told me about it says they often have people from Cornwall turn up. It happens every two weeks on the 1st and 3rd Tuesdays of the month.

Two of the new listings are for sessions in Penzance, where the lucky locals can enjoy folk events almost every night of the week. The session at the Crown Inn has been running every Monday since November 2013. Organiser Alan Shepherd, who told me about it, is also the director of the Golowan Festival. Now we are in touch I'm hoping to persuade him to let us publicise the 2019 Festival.

The other session in Penzance only started in October, and is a Cornish music session that takes place at the Admiral Benbow in Chapel Street every Thursday.

Another group with a Cornish flavour is Bagas Crowd. A community group for strings, they have been going since 2001 and I've been vaguely aware of them for


a long time, but have only recently managed to get enough details to be able to include them in our listings. They meet most Saturday mornings in Threemilestone.

Rob Burns is an active publicist for the folk scene around Falmouth and Penryn and for the Fish Factory Arts project in particular. He has started to produce a weekly email newsletter of events, and from this we have been able to include details of Acoustic Sessions at the Front Bar in Falmouth on Wednesdays, and at the Fish Factory Arts Space in Penryn on Tuesdays. When the Cross House Inn at Metherell closed back in the spring it was uncertain whether or not Mike Warman and Sylvia Watts would be able to find a replacement venue for the session that was held there. Happily they have found a welcome at the Church House Inn in Linkinhorne so we have renamed this monthly get together as the Linkinhorne Session.

Other club changes in brief to note are that the session that started in Padstow earlier this year no longer runs, and that Bodmin Folk Club have moved to another new venue at the Old Library in Lower Bore Street, where on street parking is pretty easy after 18.00 and car parks nearby. Bar with bottled beers and soft drinks, tea/coffee etc.

Finally, I've had an update from Ray Buckingham on the future of the Pensilva Folk Dance Club. Ray retired from running the club at the end of 2018, but happily he tells me they have decided to keep running every two weeks. Ray is training replacement dance callers, but is still looking for someone to take over the administration of the club. Any offers?

THE ARCHIVE TAPES Bob Devereux and Clive Palmer

Words by Bob Devereux except where indicated Clive Palmer plays banjo and Northumbian Pipes

This album was first released as a cassette in 1982 by Rainyday Records in Penzance, and I decided to release it again, in the CD format, thirty six years later, after I spotted a copy reaching a spectacular price on the web as a 'rare item'. In the late 1970s I was a Roadie/Manager for Bob and Clive.



We would travel around the West Country doing gigs for £15 here, £20 there and the occasional Festival appearance. Once we got as far as Bristol and there was one performance in London - the Big Time beckoned.....

A Record Deal very nearly came off with an album and with 'Changes' as a single, but our enthusiastic contact with the London firm left it before things could be tied up. These recordings were made as demo tapes in 1977 and 1978, Three numbers (3, 9 and 11) were released on the Rainyday Cassette 'Suns and Moons' which was later put out as a CD by Robin Williamson's Pigs Whisker label in 1999.

Clive Palmer with The Incredible String Band, Famous Jug Band, C.O.B and other groups - and Bob Devereux, with Mask have each worked with pretty stimulating company before and since, However I do think it is as this duo and as the later quartet Rhombus (also featuring Tim Wellard and Dick Reynolds) that they produced some of their most interesting work.

The Ship Inn, Wadebridge

We are saddened by the news that the Ship Inn Wadebridge has ceased to trade despite valiant efforts by landlord Rupert Wilson to keep it all afloat.

Rupert has always been supportive of the monthly sessions there to support the annual Cornwall Folk Festival and the Ship has for a long time been a major venue for the Festival. We all have very fond memories of the Ship Inn and it managed to establish itself into the hearts of Folk fans going to the Cornwall Folk Festival.

Being just "down the hill" from the Little Bodieve Campsite made it a useful "Drop in Centre" for Folk fans on their way to/from those main concerts in Town and was so well known for late night singing sessions and an occasional lock-in! I can recall staying there until breakfast one year in the back barn, with all its stored furniture which we managed to sing around. There was one guy (not me this time) asleep in the wardrobe!

It was a great pleasure later on for me to get involved in running these events and to be handed Stewardship of the Cornwall Festival between 2009 and 2016. I was then appointed its Patron along with friends Geoff Lakeman and Wizz Jones

I have been busy documenting festival activities ever since Sue Sedgewick (Bodmin Folk Club & former Cornwall Festival Secretary) handed over to me the treasured "Suitcase" with all its Festival press cuttings, pro-

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grammes and photos since 1972, including an almost complete collection of programmes running from 1972-2018. I am still missing out on two recent dates - 2007 and 2008 - so if anybody has copies or any information on these that I could possibly photocopy — that would be really wonderful, as would any useful memorabilia. I could use.

2022 will be 50th Anniversary of the Cornwall Folk Festival and we will be producing a book on its history so any writers/musicians or storytellers out there are most welcome to come forward to make their own contributions into the book. After its publication that valued "Suitcase" will be gifted over to Wadebridge Museum as a written record of all those years.

So, a huge thanks goes out to so many local musicians and fans, both past and present, who have helped keep Ship Sessions alive: Mike Freemantle, Gideon, Roger Hancock, Lar Cann, Vic and Viv Legg, Pete Marlow, Charlie Bate, Merv Vincent, Thorn and Roses, Warm Gold, Tommy Morrissey, Moe and Ernie Keast, Larry and Sean McLaughlin, Robbie and Maureen Tatlow, Peter Brand, Ann Truscott Kennedy to name but a few.

In more recent times we have been supported by - Lorraine Rooke, Alan Steel, Derek Burgoyne, Voz Faragher, Jan Miller, Sylv Watts, Mike Warman, Ian & Lin Shevill, Tim and Sue Brine, Tin Taxi, Ted Fletcher, Cataclews, Stan Mole, Spot the Dog and so many others including our current, hard working and dedicated Cornwall Folk Festival Organisers - Lynette Rentoul and Adrian Jones along with their superb Team of Stewards.

What the future now holds for the Ship Inn is still to be determined, so I hope to report back on this in a later issue, but in the meantime: Merry Xmas Folks and here's to a happy, healthy great year of Folk Music in 2019!

Cornish Connections

Our readers will I am sure be familiar with the work of the EFDSS (English Folk Dance and Song Society) as it is the leading national society for the subjects covered in this magazine. But did you know that the EFDSS has a Cornish connection featuring a famous family?

The Trefusis family has long been eminent in Cornwall. Back in the 1920's Henry Trefusis was the High Sheriff of the county. His wife Lady Mary was a patron of music, composer, director of numerous choirs and involved in setting up the Association of Competitive Festivals (for choral music).

She was also active in the folk dance movement and worked with Cecil Sharp.

When the EFDSS built their London headquarters, Cecil Sharp House, in 1929, one of the rooms was named Trefusis Hall.

Lady Mary was also active in the folk scene in Cornwall in the 1920s, acting as president and chief accompanist for the County Folk Dance Festival. In the year the festival was held in St Austell, brilliant sunshine favoured the 1000 dancers who took part. The County School in St Austell was much involved and won a number of prizes — at that time it seems there was a distinct competitive element to folk dancing.

Her husband Henry was also involved in the folk scene. He was a Morris dancer, and this interest resulted in probably one of the



earliest Morris tours in Cornwall by the Oxford University Morris Men, a founding member of the Morris Ring - who go under the title of "The Ancient Men" when travelling away from the confines of the University.

In 1929 (July 3rd-11th) they came to Cornwall for a dancing tour - and based themselves at Trefusis. During their tour they visited St Michael's Mount (thanks to the Hon Hilaria Lily St Aubin), St Ives, Marazion, Falmouth, Newquay, Mylor and St Austell. They were a very forward thinking group, as while the dancers were male, the musicians were female.

GUISE DANCING

West Cornwall's Mumming Tradition

Guise dancing is a form of mumming practised in West Cornwall. It involves dressing up in disguise and entertaining people during the twelve days of Christmas. Like many traditions, it has had its ups and downs and fallow years, but it has probably never left living memory since the middle ages.

Whilst disguised, guise dancers get up to all sorts of antics out in the streets or visiting houses and pubs. In the 18th century on the Isles of Scilly, we have an account of enthusiastic cross-dressing, parades, drinking and joke telling. The 'gambols' began in church on Christmas Day with carols and ended on Twelfth Night.

It was a much-anticipated time of year that was reported on regularly in Cornish and occasionally national newspapers. During this time, guise dancers on the islands and mainland performed the St George play, and went to great lengths to create elaborate and disturbing costumes. The spectacle of

the play being acted by outrageously dressed groups squeezed into small Cornish kitchens must have been exciting and a lot of fun.

The play died out during the 19th Century, when informal parades were favoured, with games, dancing and music. Look at the carols and tunes published by Davies Gilbert and William Sandys in the 1820s and 1830s and you have some likely music, or look to the minstrel music of the 1870s, where in St Ives in 1874 a reporter mentioned hearing Angelina Baker played in the streets. People played what was both traditional and popular so that everyone could join in.

During the 19th Century guise dancers sometimes came to blows with the authorities and some residents, especially in St Ives. The borough council repeatedly banned it, but judging from the newspaper reports, that rarely worked. Carols were bellowed, offending those used to more refined music.



One correspondent in the 1860s witheringly referred to the singing being in "u-flat".

The streets of St. Ives during the past week remind one of the descriptions given of the Roman carnival. Bands of young people, in fantastic costumes, having paraded them for hours, the processions sometimes being headed by a musical instrument, and followed by crowds of boys and girls yelling and hooting in a disgraceful manner. (Cornish Telegraph, 13th January 1887)

It was still happening in St Just in 1939: "Guise dancing is still in vogue at St Just. Each year for the past four years I have witnessed it in this town" (Western Morning News - 10th January 1939). By 1950, it was still being done at St Ives, "Over 100 adults and juveniles with veiled faces and every conceivable style of dress or costume assembled at the car park near the harbour,

and danced through the streets of the town to the strains of the Furry Dance, played by the St. Ives Town Band" (WMN - 20th January 1950). By the 1970s it was being revived again and, on-and off, still takes place.

In Penzance guise dancing is practiced by hundreds of people during the modern festival of Montol on 21st December. Many people dressing up don't realise that they are taking part in an ancient tradition, or that it has a name. Recently, the term "guising" or "guizers" has been used, but this was never used in the past in West Cornwall.

These words are used by participants of a similar practice in the north of England and Scottish borders. "Guise Dancing" is our name for our own particular flavour of this wonderful mumming tradition. Why not give it a go yourself this Christmastide?

Finding and playing Cornish music

I took up the fiddle just over three years ago, having like so many, abandoned it at school. As I was delving into the enormous world of folk fiddle music I became more and more interested in Cornish tunes, ancient and modern.

Many of these tunes have been brought to life and interpreted by bands such as the Rowan Tree, Caracana, Dalla and Davey and Dyer who also lead Nos Lowen (Happy Night) events of Cornish music and dance. Bagas Degol was also influential in my appreciation for the genre of Cornish folk.

Apart from that it is not easy to come by Cornish folk music unless you already know where to look or are part of the circuit of seasonal Cornish events or take part in a session where Cornish tunes are welcomed.


Discovering Kesson (www.kesson.com) changed my perspective on Cornish music hugely. As well as a promoter and distributor of Cornish music, it is a major free resource for easily accessible traditional and contemporary Cornish folk tunes.

Until then, Cornish music for me was limited to a couple of music books called Racca and Fooch (both excellent and Fooch has accompanying CDs). The books of historical tunes enjoyed in Cornish country houses in the 18th and 19th centuries published by Mike O'Connor in llow Kernow and a series of other books expanded my range a bit more (Lyngham House).

These are fantastic sources if you can read music, but if you can't you will be reliant on what you discover by chance.

There are others, although well out of print and not always arranged with modern instruments in mind.

Speaking about how Kesson started, founder Kyt Le Nen Davey, said: "With our Cornish music family band Anao Atao back in the nineties, we achieved distribution for our CDs countries many around the world, and beyond Europe. Our live touring took us to exciting places Tokyo, Montreal and New Orleans



When the group disbanded, it seemed a shame to let all the contacts and goodwill we had built up over the years go to waste, so I came up with the idea of Kesson as a platform to promote the work of everyone active in the Cornish music tradition.


To start with this involved distributing CDs to shops all over Cornwall and to specialist outlets abroad. Kesson evolved to offer a catalogue of downloadable Cornish music, and more recently the focus has been to encourage new people to take an interest in our musical tradition."

Kesson is home to the Tunery (follow the link at the top of the page). You can access, for free, 218 tunes and counting. For each tune there is a midi-file, the dots and ABC notation.

Kesson has also enabled several sessions with set lists to be created. It has been instrumental to a small group of us in Penzance to launch the Penzance Cornish Session at the Admiral Benbow Pub on Chapel Street every Thursday, 8-10pm.

Kyt explained how the Tunery got going: "The Tunery started out as a personal database to help me keep up to date with the expanding repertoire of Cornish tunes being played at sessions. With encouragement and contributions from Len Davies (sadly no longer with us) I developed this into a 'crowd source' online tool for the sharing of Cornish tunes.

Using as a basis the 'ABC' notation popular for Irish and Scottish music, the



Tunery converts this to standard music notation and short recordings to make the database accessible to all. Anyone can add to the database using the 'Add New' tab which brings up a simple form to complete. It is technically much easier if tunes are supplied in ABC notation, but any contributions are welcome!"

I would warmly encourage anyone wanting to explore beautiful Cornish tunes from slow airs and marches to waltzes, polkas, reels, hornpipes and jigs to bookmark and visit Kesson and the Tunery. You might also find a session near you to which you might introduce some new tunes.

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FOOCH!

The Fooch book is a selection of some of my favourite Cornish tunes being played around the sessions at the time when it came out, either traditional tunes, or tunes written by others which I felt to be written 'in the tradition', but I also included one or two of my own which people were already playing.

Tregajorran Furry ('Treggy Furry'), was written in about 1998. I live in Tregajorran (on the side of Carn Brea). Around that time my partner Hilary Coleman and a few others in the village started up Tregajorran Village Show, a modest and light hearted produce show, and an excuse to gather and have even more fun than usual each September!

We wanted our own Furry dance in the style of existing ones such as Helston Furry. I composed the tune (with a little input from Hilary) and she created the dance (with a little input from me). Treggy Show has continued ever since, and is usually held on the first Saturday in September, or the last one in August.

We dance the Treggy Furry all the way down the hill to mark the start of it each year (we used to dance up the hill and then down again, but soon gave up on that!). I was delighted when the tune (and dance) caught on elsewhere too.

Fooch Volume One is available online from www.trevadamusic.co.uk and also www.thecornishstore.co.uk (and in their shops in Camborne and Falmouth respectively). Readers may be interested to know that, after much 'nagging' from my fellow Cornish musicians, I am working on Fooch Volume Two, which is nearing completion, and will be out in the new year.
